Recap

Summary of Romans 10:9-13

In Romans 10:9-13, Paul presents the core message of the Gospel in a profoundly simple manner. He states that if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. This confession and belief signify the inward faith and outward profession that are integral to the Christian faith. Paul underscores the universality of salvation, emphasizing that there is no distinction between Jew and Gentile; the same Lord is Lord of all and richly blesses all who call on Him. The passage culminates in the promise that "Whoever will call on the name of the Lord will be saved," reinforcing the accessibility of salvation to all people, regardless of background or past sins.

- 4. **Embracing Universality:** How does the universality of the Gospel call you to change your approach to evangelism and your interactions with people of different backgrounds, or with a very sinfully blatant lifestyle?

God Has More to Say

Romans 10:9-13, emphasizes confession with the mouth that Jesus is Lord and belief in the heart that God raised Him from the dead as the path to salvation, along with the universal offer of salvation to all who call on the name of the Lord, here's a list of related passages:

- 1. **Joel 2:32:** Directly quoted in Romans 10:13, "And it shall come to pass that everyone who calls on the name of the LORD shall be saved." This Old Testament prophecy is foundational to understanding the inclusive call to salvation Paul discusses.
- 2. **Acts 2:21:** During Pentecost, Peter quotes Joel 2:32, reinforcing the message that whoever calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.
- 3. **Acts 16:30-31:** The Philippian jailer asks Paul and Silas what he must do to be saved, and they respond, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." This passage emphasizes belief in Jesus as the criterion for salvation.
- 4. **John 3:16-18:** These verses highlight the necessity of belief in Jesus for salvation and the consequence of unbelief.
- 5. **John 20:31:** John states the purpose of his Gospel is that readers may believe Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and by believing they may have life in His name, echoing the necessity of belief for salvation found in Romans 10:9-13.
- 6. **1 John 4:15:** "Whoever confesses that Jesus is the Son of God, God abides in him, and he in God." This passage connects the confession of Jesus as Lord with a relationship with God, paralleling Paul's emphasis on confession for salvation.
- 7. **1 Corinthians 12:3:** Paul notes that no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except in the Holy Spirit, underscoring the role of the Holy Spirit in the confession of faith in Jesus.
- 8. **Matthew 10:32:** Jesus says, "So everyone who acknowledges me before men, I also will acknowledge before my Father who is in heaven".
- 9. **Hebrews 11:6:** "And without faith it is impossible to please him, for whoever would draw near to God must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who seek him." This underscores the necessity of faith, akin to the belief in the heart.
